DISCUSSION LEADER'S GUIDE: FILM TALK! LEAD WITH QUESTIONS

TO THE LEADER: One of the most important tools of film analysis is "the question framework" answering all the question words as they relate to film. In leading the discussion, you may want to write the question words on a whiteboard, checking them off after they've been answered. Some questions ask for recall of the film. In answering questions like, "Why?" or "What do you think?," higher order thinking is engaged.

INTRODUCE THE ACTIVITY TO THE AUDIENCE:

"One of the best ways to talk about a film is to answer all the Question Words. Name all the question words you know. Let's use these questions to talk about the film/s."

WHO is in the film? WHO ARE THE CHARACTERS in the film?

WHAT KIND OF film is this?

- Is this film in the LIVE-ACTION STYLE, or is it in the CARTOON/ ANIMATION style?
- Do you think the events in this film really happened (DOCUMENTARY), or
- Do you think this is a made-up (FICTION) story?
- Is this the kind of film that is about a PROBLEM/ CONFLICT, or is this a film about how film techniques can be used to create art?

WHERE do the events of the film take place?

Tell me about the SETTING:
—In what country? In a city or the countryside?

WHEN do the events of the film take place?

• In the present time, in a past time, in a future time? In what season of the year?

WHAT is the PROBLEM/ CONFLICT in the film?

WHAT HAPPENS in the film? Summarize/ shorten your ideas to explain:

- WHAT HAPPENS in the beginning of the film?
- WHAT HAPPENS in the middle of the film?
- WHAT HAPPENS at the end of the film?

If you had to pick one MAIN IDEA for this film, WHAT would it be?

WHY do you think the filmmaker made this film?

- What ideas were they trying to SHOW?
- Do you think the filmmakers had a MESSAGE or LESSON or THEME?

HOW did the filmmaker show their ideas?

- HOW did they use VISUAL PICTURES?
- HOW did they use SOUND to tell the story: music, sound effects, dialogue?
- Film Review! What do you think?

Set – a place that is built or made to show the setting

Setting – the imaginary place where the film events happen

Shot – the moving picture seen from the time the camera is turned on until the camera is turned off

Storyboard – drawings of the camera shots with words that describe the pictures

Theme – the main idea of the story

Writer – the person who writes the film script
